

Nasty VLĂDOIU

President of the Romania-Ukraine Bilateral Chamber of Commerce, Romania

Nasty Vlădoiu was born on August 11, 1972, in Pitești, Romania. He is a university professor specializing in Public International Law at the Faculty of Law, Transilvania University of Brașov, a position he has held since 2010, and a practicing lawyer at the Bucharest Bar since 1997.

His academic and research interests focus on Public International Law, International Economic Law, and Diplomatic and Consular Law. He graduated from the Law Faculty of “Nicolae Titulescu” University, specializing in Law and International Relations in 1996. He holds a PhD in Legal Sciences, with a specialization in Constitutional Law and Political Institutions from the University of Bucharest (2006), as well as a PhD in National Security and Intelligence from the “Carol I” National Defense University (2005). His training also includes the National Security College at the National Intelligence Academy of the Romanian Intelligence Service (2002), the “Carol I” National Defense College (2003), a master’s degree from “Carol I” National Defense University (2007), the Romanian Diplomatic Institute (2007), and Georgetown University in the USA (2008).

In addition to his academic and legal career, Nasty Vlădoiu has held prominent positions in several non-governmental and professional organizations. He is the President of the Union of Bilateral Chambers of Commerce in Romania (since 2012), President of the Organization of Chambers for Sustainable Diplomacy (since 2023), and President of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry Romania-Ukraine (since 2011). He also serves as Chairman of the International Union of Bilateral Chambers of Commerce and Industry in the USA (since 2014) and as an Arbitrator at the International Commercial Arbitration Court of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry of Romania (since 2009).

Through his professional and academic work, Nasty Vlădoiu has built a distinguished career combining expertise in international law, diplomacy, business, and arbitration, contributing significantly to both national and international legal and commercial practices.
